To mark the 50th anniversary of the 1968 Race Relations Act, the House of Commons has appointed artist Scarlett Crawford to lead a UK-wide project to capture the voices of the people it most affected. The project is designed for communities across the country to come together to share their memories of life in the UK over the past 50 years and to celebrate the people in their communities who have made a difference. Participants will also discuss how this, and later Acts of Parliament, impacted on their lives.

In Leeds the House of Commons is working with The University of Leeds to host free workshops on:

- · Thursday 11th October
- · Friday 12th October
- · Saturday 13th October

These workshops will be held at Leeds University Union, 4 Lifton Place, Leeds, LS2 9JZ.

The workshops are open to anyone who would like to work on a project about race equality but are aimed particularly at first generation immigrants and those living in the UK in the 1960s and 70s.

Participants will also work together with the artist on an exhibition, which will be displayed in The University of Leeds in December 2018 and in the Houses of Parliament in early 2019. These exhibitions will display art works made during the workshops and will be free to attend.
